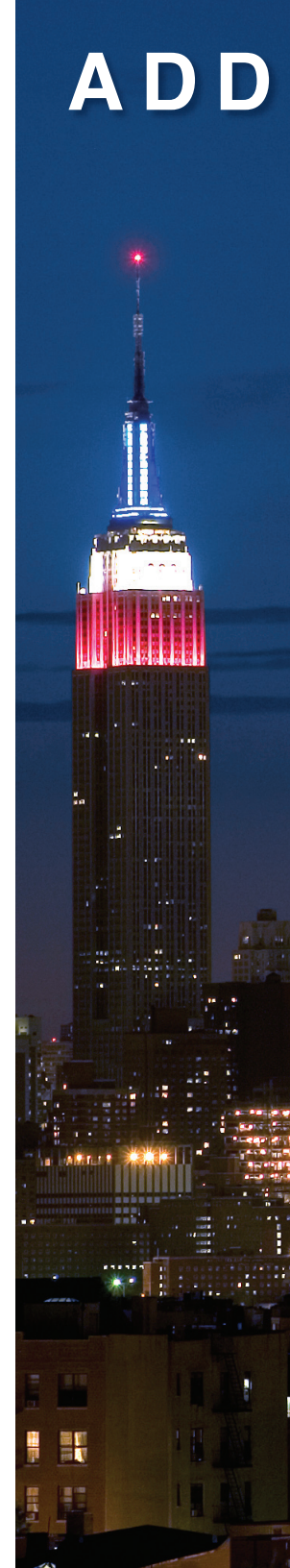

*When Right is Not Enough: Health, Equity, and the
Future of Drug Policy in New York*

Since 1973, the Rockefeller Drug Laws have been New York's guiding drug policy — whereby the criminal justice system plays a primary role, profoundly shaping prevention, treatment, and even harm reduction. The basis of the approach includes mandatory prison terms, sometimes life sentences, for even mere possession of drugs. With their reform, New York has the first opportunity in nearly 40 years to rethink its drug policies. Will our policies continue to be driven by science, compassion, health and human rights? What will it take to realize the promise of drug law reform?
